Presentation: Dave Ramsey, Educator at SASS who has spoken to the Club in the past, returned to update us on the progress of his 2014 curriculum initiative about the Shuswap Watershed. It has morphed into a province-wide program called BC Tomorrow. The focus tonight was "Land Use Planning in the Schools". This highly interactive 3-part program includes a video series, a simulator which students can use to evaluate elements of the landscape and manipulate variables to see past and future conditions, and field studies. Dave described the high level of engagement by the students and how they are applying critical thinking and decision making skills as they learn to address environmental and socioeconomic concerns within the Shuswap community.

1) Environmental Action Committee: Janet Pattinson reported on the latest meeting where a suggestion was made to change the yard size restrictions for keeping chickens, bees in city backyards. This might be a way to help address food security concerns.

2) SABNES: Janet Aitken reported the Canada Summer Job Grant will allow hiring of 1 student. Also, the Grant for \$19,220 is in place for the bird viewing platform, work to begin after nesting season. Carla Kirkpatrick urged everyone to report dogs off leash to the Shuswap Trail Alliance (check their website for the link, "report trail issue", eg. black lab at 10:40 am) and try to take a photo, but avoid a

confrontation. Or call the Bylaw Officer at 250-803-4000. Reports go to the City which provides SABNES with funds for signage about restrictions to dogs on the trail until June 30.

Marcia Woods – 6 snow geese in the field adjacent to the fairgrounds.
